






Figure 1. University tuition fees by source in Canada, 2006-2007 to 2015-2016, in figures in billions of constant \$2016 (Usher, 2018, p. 2). Reprinted with permission.

Public universities in the U.S. recorded 5.1 reports of alleged cheating for every 100 international students, versus one report per 100 domestic students, in a Wall Street Journal analysis

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


The University's total number of international students reported for AIVs amounted to less than 7.5% of the total number who were enrolled. These findings indicated that AIVs were reported to a lesser degree than what would be expected if cheating were a vulnerability to international students. (Fass-Holmes, 2017, p. 660)

Researchers have found that students who admit to cheating perceive their classroom environment to be “less personalized, less involving, less cohesive, less satisfying, less task oriented, and less individualized (Pulvers & Diekhoff, 1999, p. 495). Thus, rather than convincing students to stop cheating, the goal of the teaching and learning strategy is to foster a learning-oriented environment that will motivate students to engage in the course material. (Bertram Gallant & Drinan, 2008, p. 89)

Dissatisfaction with the T&L environment

Theoretical foundations (or lack of)

- *Deterrence theory* – The magnitude of punishments can reduce the frequency of cheating.
- *Rational choice theory* – Students decide to cheat after conducting a logical cost-benefit analysis.
- *Neutralization theory* – Cheating happens when students decide it is morally inoffensive.
- *Planned behavior theory* – Students are presented with situations where they are likely to get away with it.
- *Situational ethics theory* – Students decide to cheat in academic circumstances which do not apply to ordinary life.
- *Self-efficacy theory* – Students make judgments about their ability to achieve a desired outcome.
- *Goal theory* – Students hold a notion for their education's purpose.
- *Intrinsic motivation theory* – students possess a genuine desire to understand and master their academic studies. (Fass-Holmes, 2017, p. 648).



Professor Accused of Saying 'All Chinese Students Cheat' Resigns

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A business professor at the University of Maryland who accused a group of Chinese students of cheating on a test has resigned after students filed a discrimination complaint against him, the National Public Radio affiliate WAMU [reported](#). Several students said they felt targeted by their race and national origin and that David Weber made statements like “All Chinese students cheat their way into the U.S.” Weber said statements attributed to him were misquoted or taken out of context and that he was trying to uphold Maryland's academic honesty policies.

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Australia hosting unprecedented numbers of international students

Australia is hosting unprecedented numbers of international students, who now make up more than a quarter of enrolments at some universities.

The number of international students in Australia has increased by 12 per cent this year as enrolment numbers continue to rise exponentially.

Department of Education figures show that in February, Australian universities, private colleges, English language courses, and schools registered a combined 542,054 enrolments.

That compares with 305,534 total enrolments five years ago.

Students from China make up the largest proportion of students at 31 per cent, followed by India, Nepal, Malaysia and Vietnam.

The Australian government will introduce a new law to punish those providing or advertising commercial cheating services to higher education students.

The law would apply whether those services are delivered from within Australia or overseas, according to its [response](#) to a [report](#) from the Higher Education Standards Panel. The legislation would involve a national law, relying on federal powers with respect to communications, corporations, trade and commerce, territories, and “aliens,” to be supported by supplementary laws and regulations enacted through states and territories to cover any regulatory gaps that arise.


Enrolments of international students from India in Canadian universities and colleges, 2008/2009 to 2016/2017


